### COLLABORATIVE EDUCATION GROUP:

### **CULINARY ARTS COURSE:**

#### **APPLE CRISP:**

This is a recipe we did in class with wonderful results. Rome, Granny Smith, Gala, Braeburn, and Cortland apples are best although any variety of apples will work. Bring the family apple picking and reap the rewards with this easy and delicious treat. Cover leftovers (if there are any!) and keep at room temperature for a few days. Re-warm in the microwave or just uncover and eat!

4 medium tart cooking apples, sliced  
(4 cups)

¾ cup brown sugar

½ cup all-purpose flour

½ quick-cooking or old-fashioned oats

1/3 cup butter or margarine, cut into  
small ¼ inch pieces

3/4 teaspoon of cinnamon

Peel and core apples (remove seeds and tough membrane) and slice thin, about ¼ in. width. Arrange apples in an 8 in pie pan.

- 1 Mix brown sugar, flour, oats, butter or margarine and cinnamon together. Rub gently with your hands so the mixture resembles coarse sand.
- 2 Sprinkle evenly over apples and bake at 350° for about 30 minutes or until apples are tender.
- 3 Serve warm with vanilla ice cream or fresh whipped cream (recipe below).

#### **Fresh Whipped Cream**

1 cup heavy or whipping cream

1 Tablespoon sugar

Pinch of vanilla

*In a cold stainless steel bowl and with a wire whisk, whip cream, sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Don't over beat or the cream will break.*

### **ADAMS MCAS SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS:**

Massachusetts public school students are eligible for the scholarship when they score at the *Advanced* and *Proficient* levels on grade 10 MCAS tests in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. (A student must earn a score of *Advanced* on the ELA or Mathematics test and a score of *Proficient* or higher on the second test; AND have a combined score that places them in the top 25% of the graduating class in their district. Eligibility for the scholarship is based on a student's first attempt at taking the grade 10 tests in ELA and Mathematics. In order to receive the scholarship, students must be enrolled in a Massachusetts public high school in their senior year and will receive an award letter in the fall of their senior year. The scholarship can only be used for attendance at a Massachusetts school of higher learning. Our winners are:

### **MOBILE TRAINING UNIT VISITS THE 8<sup>TH</sup> GRADE ACADEMY:**

The 8th grade Academy at GHS was excited to have the MassMEP Mobile Training Unit (MTU) at our school on 12/17 and 12/18. Thanks to Gary Howe from the Greenfield Career Center for helping bring this program to us. The MTU is a full size bus that has twelve computer stations and two computerized mini-machines that perform actual machining operations.

The program targets 8th grade students to assist them in their potential career choices. A recent study conducted by Northeastern University estimates that "MA stands to see more than 100,000 job openings in manufacturing by 2016."

“8th graders attended the program during their Science classes for 45 minutes. When we hopped onto the bus, we **sat** down in chairs at computer stations. Then we typed in coordinates that created a star. When we were done punching in the coordinates, we hit the button and the machine went to work. After making some weird noises, it stopped and out popped a star with a circle around it! We observed a second machine whose program was more than 1,000 lines long and it created a chess pawn. After all that was over, we watched a video on careers based in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics and another about the manufacturing of Boeing airplanes. ### **VISIT BY STATE TROOPER:**

On **January 8**, Trooper Dana Lavigne from the Massachusetts State Police Academy in New Braintree came to speak to the 8th Grade Academy about life as a state trooper. She shared her personal story of how she became a state trooper. She explained that in order to apply to the Police Academy, you need a high school diploma or its equivalent. A college degree in criminal justice is a welcome addition for any prospective applicant. The successful applicant must pay attention to specific details and deadlines, and also pass the tests. Trooper Lavigne stated that the \$30 application fee was the best money she ever spent; it was gratifying to get a job she likes and one that pays well too!

There are many steps to complete before you can graduate as a State Police officer. Each stage has its share of physical and emotional demands. Trooper Lavigne stated that she had wanted to succeed at any cost, so it was important for her to focus on the goal of succeeding, rather than on the stresses that surfaced along the way. At the Academy she learned the value of teamwork and the idea that she was never done with any task until everyone else was done also! Some cadets resigned and chose not to endure the rigorous training. Others, like Trooper Lavigne survived to embark on a rich and rewarding career in the State Police.

Trooper Lavigne shared a closing thought with us. She said, "A good education and thorough training in your chosen field will prepare you for whatever problems life may present."

**FRANKLIN COUNTY TECH SCHOOL PRESENTATION:**

On November 12th, Mr. Carey, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, came and told us about the Tech School, how we can get in, and what it is like there. The criteria for getting into the Tech School are behavior, grades, and effort in school. It was really cool when he showed us the pictures of the Tech School. In the slide show, students were learning CPR on a fake doll, which showed students when it needed help. He said he didn't want to talk a lot so that students could look at what the school looked like. After the slideshow was over, we asked questions. For example, I heard that you don't have classes' everyday. Mr. Carey responded, "That it was true. Trades include Auto Body Repair, Automotive Technology, Business Technology, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts, Electrical, Health Tech, Information Tech, Landscaping, Machine Tech, Plumbing/Heating, and Welding/Metal Fab. At the Tech School, one week is academic courses and the next week is shop week."
