The Greenfield Schools 1st Annual Greenfield Schools Film Festival, April 1&2, 2011—a big success.

“We had a great time at the film festival! The film festival was a wonderful community event and a great opportunity to let some of our students shine. We look forward to next year's film festival.”

This year Greenfield Public Schools launched the first ever GPS Film Festival, engaging our entire K-12 school system – in filmmaking, organizing and participating in a film festival. Everyone was encouraged to try out their creativity with a camera. Films were made by whole classes, small groups, and individual students. A gala public Film Festival two-day event was held on April 1 and 2, 2011 at Greenfield High School.

Films ranged in length from 45 seconds to 5 minutes (the maximum length allowed). There were all kinds of films – educational films, musicals, documentaries, fiction telling a wide variety of stories, adventures, films with a message, sports films, comedies, mysteries, and even a G-rated thriller. While most filmed real people, some filmmakers used claymation, toymation, or animation techniques. Several elementary films included student artwork. The students clearly learned a lot and had creative fun in the process.

We had a remarkable response, with a total of 59 films submitted by students in K-12. Of those, 23 were selected to show at the festival. At GHS, 8 films were submitted and all 8 were also shown at the festival. Everyone enjoyed the films, and learned about voting, through voting by paper ballot for their favorite film.

The prize winners at GHS were: Dan Pelc and Mary Brouder tied for 1st place. Alex Richardson, Josh Brandl, and Angela Mass’ Social Justice Class tied for 2nd place. Paul Phillips, Joseph Parzych, and the Green Wave TV and Film class tied for 3rd place. The audience award went to Mary Brouder for her film “The High Note.”

We couldn’t have done it without the technical expertise of three school faculty, who provided technical, filmmaking, and editing support to students and staff. Elementary technology teacher, Rachel Cronin-Townsend worked with classes at all three elementary schools. At the middle school, 6th grade social studies teacher and TV Studio advisor, Chip Bull provided technical support. Using editing and camera equipment in the newly-re-opened GHS TV Studio, Drew Hutchison created the final DVDs of selected films for each division of the film festival as well as providing film-making and editing support (and classes) to GHS students in grades 9-12.

The Grade Eight Academy has set a firm foundation that will provide the base for high academic achievement throughout the high school years. ZOOM IN - Friday Lunch Lecture Series

The *Zoom In* Friday lunch lecture series introduced students to a wide variety of new, unusual, and interesting topics. This unique program is one of many enrichment opportunities that puts Greenfield HS ahead of other schools. The following speakers and topics were presented since the last newsletter:

Rebuilding Haiti - Two recent HS graduates, Milo Childs-Campolo & Braeden Leingart, gave an inspiring slide show, sharing their experience of re-building housing in Haiti for a month.

Stefan Topolski, MD shared the health effects of energy drinks - followed by open questions on any medical or health issues (career, health, studying, etc.). **Gina Agostini**, a UMass grad student, presented “Forensic Anthropology: The Stories Bones Tell.” She shared slides, bone casts, and info on a special GHS/UMass summer course.

Ashli Stempel, a 2005 GHS graduate, shared her story of becoming a successful broadcast journalist at a top-40 radio station. She talked about careers in journalism, and how social media – how you “brand” yourself on line – impacts your future.

Special Summer Course: Biological Anthropology: Bones, Fossils, DNA, and Beyond

Greenfield High School & UMass Amherst are offering an exciting one-week summer short course in Biological Anthropology (the study of past and present humans), during August 1 – 5, 2011. Students will learn about human evolution, forensic anthropology, genetics, biological profiles, archaeology, primatology, and generally why bones are so important, and will use anthropological lab/field techniques. The course is open to 11 GHS students in good standing who are going into grades 9-12 in September. This is an exceptional opportunity for GHS students to study on a college campus, and to learn about biological anthropology, which is not generally available at the high school level.
